

Philippians 2:7 — He "made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant"



Neal A. Maxwell gave this insight regarding the ironic condition on which the Lord entered mortality:

"In heaven, Christ's lofty name was determined to be the only name on earth offering salvation to all mankind (Acts 4:12; 2 Nephi 25:20; see also Abraham 3:27), yet the King of kings, the Mortal Messiah, willingly lived modestly, wrote Paul, even as a person 'of no reputation' (Philippians 2:7).

"What a contrast to our maneuvering over relative recognition and comparative status! How different, too, from the ways in which some among us mistakenly see the size and response of their audiences as the sole verification of their worth! Yet those fickle galleries to which we

sometimes play have a way of being rotated and emptied. They will surely be empty on Judgment Day; everyone will be somewhere else—on their knees."

Philippians 2:8 — He "humbled himself, and became obedient to death"

Christ, the perfect child, came into the world and submitted His will to that of His Father in Heaven (John 4:34; 5:19) even unto death. We too can "putteth off the natural man and becometh a saint through the atonement of Christ the Lord, and becometh as a child, submissive, meek, humble, patient, full of love, willing to submit to all things which the Lord seeth fit to inflict upon [us], even as a child doth submit to his father" (Mosiah 3:19).

"Quickened" by Jesus Christ

Colossians 2:13

To be "quickened" means to be made alive. One who has been spiritually dead because of sin can be made spiritually alive through submission to the first principles and ordinances of the gospel. He is raised to a newness of life in Jesus Christ through forgiveness of past sins.

Spencer W. Kimball said:

"Our loving Father has given us the blessed principle of repentance as the gateway to forgiveness. All sins but those excepted by the Lord—basically, the sin against the Holy Ghost, and murder—will be forgiven to those who totally, consistently, and continueously repent in a genuine and comprehensive transformation of life. There is forgiveness for even the sinner who commits serious transgressions, for the Church will forgive and the Lord will forgive such things when repentance has reached fruition."
